## Neighbourhood Centre Week

Neighbourhood Centre week gave SNCC the opportunity to engage with the community by hosting a stall in the Springwood Town Square. Staff promoted the services, groups, activities, and events offered by SNCC and built positive connections with community members. This was facilitated with the help of custom made chocolates and cookies. Neighbourhood Centre week was an opportunity for the community to let us know what they loved about Springwood Neighbourhood Centre. Cards were written on and stuck to a fabric house display throughout the week

## **Volunteer Week**

Springwood Neighbourhood Centre would not be the vibrant and welcoming place it is without the incredible efforts of our team of volunteers. Our volunteers contribute in many ways including working on reception, as digital mentors, social support visitors and helping with many of our events and activities. SNCC celebrated our volunteer team at an afternoon tea held during National Volunteer Week in May. This was just one small way of showing our appreciation for all that they do for us.

## Blue Fringe Art & Literature Festival

After two years of hosting a virtual gallery, the Blue Fringe art exhibition was back in the physical space of Wentworth Falls TAFE building. Blue Fringe aims to reduce the stigma of mental health and celebrate the creativity of people with a lived experience by offering a safe and inclusive space which promotes a sense of belonging. SNCC worked in collaboration with Belong BM, the Blue Mountains Women's Health and Resource Centre and a small committee of volunteers to raise money and organise the event. There were a total of 115 art entries for the categories of painting, photography, sculpture and textiles. Literature received 37 entries, made up of poetry and short stories.

## **Emergency Food Support**

There was a marked increase in the demand for food support this year, with some community members reporting this being the first time they had sought food relief.

We are able to continue this service thanks to the generous donations of the community via the IGA's collection bins.
Additionally, Wentworth
Bakehouse, Schwartz Bakery and
a grant from Bendigo Bank are
vital for the continuation of
this service.

## **DARE Morning Tea**

A group from DARE Disability continued to visit the Centre fortnightly and enjoy a morning tea of fresh scones, jam and cream. This creates an opportunity for engagement between DARE participants and other visitors to the drop-in lounge.

## Mental Health First Aid

SNCC, in collaboration with Winmalee Neighbourhood Centre and Blackheath Area Neighbourhood Centre delivered nine mental health first aid workshops, covering suicide prevention, the older person, youth and standard mental health first aid.

## International Women's Day

SNCC hosted the 2023 Community Morning Tea & Young Women's Forum in partnership with Zonta & Science at the Local This successful event was attended by more than 100 people from 4 local high schools who heard from some powerful women within the community. Keynote speakers Trish Doyle MP and Andrea Turner-Boys from Women in Altitude spoke to the attendees about their personal experiences of being a woman in todays world while two Winmalee High School students, Abbie-Rose Whale and Tully McGrouther, represented the voices of young women in our community. This event was catered by the students from Springwood High.

## TANDERRA OOSH

Report by Tanderra OOSH Co-ordinator / Nominated Supervisor Suzanne Allnutt.

The contribution of the staff to generate a supportive, inclusive atmosphere for the children was invaluable this year. The team worked hard to create programmes in collaboration with the children to peak their interest, challenge their abilities, promote collaboration and positive relationships as well as creating plenty of space for relaxation.

Tanderra began work on our Reconciliation Action Plan which forms part of our recognition of the role and place of indigenous Australians in the landscape of modern society. Some of the steps Tanderra took as part of the RAP included creating a visual acknowledgement of country with children and staff, and celebrating indigenous days, themes and special events. Our indigenous members of staff played a key role in facilitating special events within the centre. These included a Koori nail and body art day, indigenous games and creating collages using natural treasures collected on a bushwalk. We made wattle-seed damper with Rosella and Lilly Pilly jam and told stories about the dreamtime creation, which extended into the children's own invented stories. This work was underpinned by the introduction of Aboriginal Ways of Learning, which was introduced last year and is now a part of My Time, Our Place, the school age learning framework. Tanderra continued to build strong relationships

in our community this year, engaging in the following activities:

- barefoot bowls with senior volunteers liaising with and guiding the children,
- slot car racing with Rick's Slot Cars,
- movie trips to the Hub
- Chinese lunches at the local Chinese Restaurant.

Activities chosen by the children included making a burger, trips to Don Bosco's Sports Centre, waterplay days, a trip to Inflatable World and mobile laser tag.

To support the childrens appreciation of and connection to nature, the Tanderra programme included bushwalks, gardening, cooking, bushcraft workshops and recycled art.

To help promote fitness and wellbeing we included plenty of physical activities such as Zumba workshops, obstacle courses, circus workshops, dragon kung fu, and gymnastics.

A highlight for children, families and staff was the "Breakfast on the Run" fundraiser which was conceived of, planned and implemented by some of the older children. With the help of the staff, the children researched muffin recipes, prices, made signs and distributed invitations. On 15 March parents were invited to buy breakfast on their way to work which consisted of a tasty, nutritious muffin and a hot drink. The children raised over \$200 which was donated to the WWF to support the endangered platypus. This event showed the childrens initiative and entrepreneurial abilities, in addition to their care and concern for the environment. Year 6 children enjoyed several special events in Springwood exclusive to their age group, one of which was the Afternoon Teas on the Town. The event promotes childrens transition to high school,

supporting growing autonomy and need for time to share their feelings with peers.

Behind the scenes the staff worked hard to improve the service and adapt it to the needs of the community. Staff undertook training to improve their skills including in Child Protection, First Aid, Child Safe Standards and Educational Leader training. Regulatory changes that impacted the service included the introduction of the BASC voucher scheme, a one-off initiative designed to support the utilization of OOSH services in the community. The scheme stretched from February 2022 until June 2023 and allowed families the opportunity to apply for vouchers worth \$500 per child. Additionally, the introduction of the Child Safe Standards aims to ensure organisations have policies and procedures to support best outcomes for childrens safety and wellbeing.

the Blue Mountains Bush Fire Resilience team kicked into gear. July saw the launch of the Blue Mountains Bush Fire Resilience website (bmbushfire.org.au) with an official launch held in October. Springwood Neighbourhood Centre hosted a mix of guests from the local community, council members, colleagues from other community organisations, through to Susan Templeman MP - our Local Federal Member for Macquarie and The Parliament Secretary, Shayne Mallard. We received a wonderful welcome to

country from Uncle Colin Locke. Throughout the year a series of different community engagement events have been created and held throughout the Blue Mountains targeting several different vulnerable cohorts including seniors and people with a disability. A conscious decision has been made to ensure that although the events have focussed on a particular cohort every event held is both inclusive and accessible.

With a view to obtaining tangible outcomes the Blue Mountains Bush Fire Resilience Team collaborated with the RFS to run a series of face to face and virtual events that focussed on helping the local Blue Mountains community to create a bush fire plan that is shared with household members.

This year through community engagement we have achieved a total of 34 events. These took place throughout 14 of the 27 villages within the Blue Mountains LGA. These events helped us to connect with approximately 620 of our Blue Mountains community through these activities.

To date the property preparation service received over 85 expressions of interest and

assisted over 75 vulnerable community members to help prepare their properties for the upcoming bush fire season. This was achieved in collaboration with Habitat 4 Humanity and Neighbourhood Jobs. The collaboration with Neighbourhood Jobs helped 12 disadvantaged youth to gain a range of skills and experiences in bush fire property preparation from work health and safety through to dealing with clients and property preparation (although always under supervision).

## Commonwealth Home Support Program (CHSP)

Matching volunteers with elderly clients needing social support is an important service that SNCC provides. It brings people together and helps to keep isolated, frail and vulnerable individuals living independently in their homes and feeling connected to their local community.

Those volunteering with the CHSP either visit or take their client out on a weekly or fortnightly basis for one to two hours per session. The benefits certainly go both ways and when asked what they get out of volunteering, most reply with statements like: "We get on really well, the two hours go so

quickly" and "It gives my week purpose and something to look forward to".

Family members, particularly adult children who may live far away or work fulltime, are grateful knowing that someone is checking in and making a positive impact on their parent or partner's day. The elderly person is often more comfortable asking their volunteer for help than their own family as it gives them a sense of independence.

Recruiting volunteers for the CHSP remains a challenge. A permanent listing on SEEK and promoting the service on flyers has resulted in a slow but steady flow of enquiries. The age of volunteers in the program ranges from 23 to 89!

In 2022/23 SNCC's staff and volunteers delivered 1, 290 output hours to CHSP clients, consisting of home visits, accompanied activities and phone calls. That is an average of 24 hours per week.

## Be Connected & Digital Mentors

In our community, SNCC recognise that many individuals face various challenaes. One of these challenges may be dealing with isolation, which can have a negative impact on their well-being. To address this issue and to keep up with the constant advancements in digital technology, SNCC offers access to five highly skilled mentors. Each mentor possesses expertise in a specific area, ensuring that students are matched with the right person for their specific needs. Our mentors have helped 38 clients over 101 hours of service. Thanks to our partnership with the Good Shepherd Foundation and the Federal government's Be Connected initiative, community members also have the opportunity to access online module-based training. This grants students access to a wide range of training modules designed to support their learning and ultimately help them stay connected.

## **Activities**

Throughout 2023 SNCC continued its commitment to keeping the community connected, offering a diverse range of groups and activities including Shine Community Choir, Springwood Acoustic Club, Tai Chi Qui Gong, Art Social and FUNctional Fitness. The invaluable dedication of our facilitators has been instrumental in sustaining this vital support. These groups offer community members the opportunity to connect and build social relationships.

Shine Community Choir (SCC) celebrated its 10th anniversary this year, a significant milestone. In 2022 SCC supported the local business community by performing at late night Christmas shopping in Springwood while in May 2023 the group performed at the opening of the new Springwood Library.

Springwood Acoustic Club welcomed anyone who wanted to sing a song, recite a poem, or just listen in. The November meeting included a featured artist Overland Telegraph, the first since COVID lockdowns, and the group refreshed their logo.

Tai Chi/Qigong class continued to be a popular activity, drawing a consistently strong attendance every week. Members participated enthusiasticially and liked to engage socially outside of the group. Group facilitator Anna noticed significant enhancements in individuals' balance, coordination, and overall confidence. Similarly, FUNctional Fitness maintained high levels

of community engagement this year. Group members enjoyed not only the exercise but formed close knit friendships, often meeting after class for coffee.

The Art Social group provided a welcoming space for artists of all skill levels to come together, create art, and enjoy each others company. The group celebrated Betty Smith's inaugural solo exhibition at Braemar Gallery in Springwood, a significant milestone in Betty's artistic journey.



## **The Majors & Minors**

SNCC continued our Major and Minors program this year. Majors and Minors brings together Seniors and preschool children for some highly entertaining activities. We've enjoyed craft, singing, stories, outdoor play and even Seated Yoga! All of which were enjoyed by both young and old.

Research has shown how great of a positive impact intergenerational programs have for all involved. Children learn patience, communication skills and respect. They also learn much from older adults who share their knowledge, skills and interests. For older participants, these activities are an opportunity to connect with not only the children, but each other. Intergenerational programs help reduce social isolation, improve self-esteem and result in an increased sense of belonging and purpose. Additionally, they are lots of fun!

### What's Next?

SNCC recently received funding from the Nepean Blue Mountains Primary Health Network to run two 10-week Intergenerational Programs during the 2023/2024 financial year. We look forward to sharing positive stories and photos from these programs, along with our other intergenerational initiatives, in our next report.



## TREASURER'S REPORT

The financial position of Springwood Neighbourhood Centre Cooperative Ltd (SNCC) remains stable and, as in previous years, we have worked towards improving efficiency operationally and financially.

Although the Profit and Loss Statement for the 2023 financial year indicates a loss of approximately \$42,0000 in real terms the financial position improved from the previous year. The loss resulted from a delayed receipt of approximately \$237,000 for the final tranche of grant funding for the Bushfire Resilience and Recovery Project (R&R project).

The increase in project and events expenses can largely be attributed to a full year of operation for the R&R project whilst the increase in operational

costs reflects the approximately \$65,000 expended to replace the roof of our two properties in Raymond Road, Springwood.

As in previous years we have set aside sufficient provision to cover inevitable increases in expenses and ongoing maintenance of the two properties.

The Balance Sheet at 30 June 2023 is strong and indicates that the organisation is solvent and able to meet the expectations of funding bodies and the community.

The SNCC Board are keen to work with staff, volunteers, funding bodies and the broader community to improve and expand our services to the community in the 2024 financial year.

## Report on the Financial Report

I have audited the accompanying financial report of Springwood Neighbourhood Centre Co-operative Limited, being a special purpose financial report, which comprises the Statement by Members of the Committee, the Statement of Comprehensive Income, the Statement of Financial Position, the Statement of Accounting Policies and explanatory notes for the financial year ended 30 June 2023.

## Board of Management's Responsibility for the Financial Report

The Board of Management of the Co-operative is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial report in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards (including Australian Accounting Interpretations). The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgement, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial report, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial report in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by the committee, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial report.

## Notes to and forming part of the accounts For the year ended 30 June 2023

## Note 1. Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

The financial report is a general purpose financial report that has been prepared for the use by the members of SNCC in accordance with the requirements of the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission act 2012, the Corporations Act 2001 and Australian Accounting Standards and other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Standards Board. A statement of compliance with the International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) cannot be made due to the Group Applying not-for-profit specific requirements contained in the Australian Accounting Standards.

The financial report covers Springwood Neighbourhood Centre Co-operative Limited as an individual entity.

The following is a summary of the material accounting policies adopted by the Board Directors who have determined that such policies are appropriate to meet the needs of the members in the preparation of the financial report. The accounting policies have been consistently applied unless otherwise stated.

## A) Basis of preparation

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical cost and does not take into account changing money values or, except where stated, current valuations of non-current assets for which the fair value basis of accounting has been applied.

## B) Accounting Policies

## a) Plant and Equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost less, where applicable any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount from those assts. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows that will be received from the assets employed and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have not been discounted to present values in determining the recoverable amounts.

All other assets acquired during the year have been expenses at the date of purchase.

### b) Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets are depreciated over the useful lives of the asset to SNCC commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use, or have been fully expensed as appropriate. The asset residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at each balance sheet date.

## Employee benefits

Provision is made for the liability for employee entitlements arising from services rendered by employees to balance date. Employee entitlements have been measured at the amount expected to be paid when the liability is settled. Any re-measurements arising from experience adjustments and changes in assumptions are recognised in profit or loss in the periods in which the changes occur. The Board of Management has determined that these amounts are adequate.

## d) Provisions

Provisions are measured at the estimated expenditure required to settle the present obligation, based on the most reliable evidence available at the reporting date, including the risks and uncertainties associated with the present obligation. No liability is recognised if an outflow of economic resources as a result of present obligations is not probable. Such situations are disclosed as contingent liabilities, unless the outflow of resources is remote in which case no liability is recognised. The Board of Management has determined that these outflows are adequate.

## e) Income taxes

No provision for income tax has been raised as the entity is exempt from income tax under Div. 50 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*.

### Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and demand deposits, together with other short-term, highly liquid investments that are readily convertible into known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

### g) Revenue

Revenue comprises revenue from government grants, fundraising, donations, interest and memberships.

Interest revenue is recognised on a proportional basis taking into account the interest rates applicable to the financial asset.

Revenue from the rendering of service is recognised upon the delivery of the service to the customers and is measured at fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed.

### h) Government Grants

A number of the entity's programs are supported by grants received from the federal, state and local governments.

If conditions are attached to a grant which must be satisfied before the entity is eligible to receive the contribution, recognition of the grant as revenue is deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

Where a grant is received on the condition that specified services are delivered to the grantor, this is considered a reciprocal transaction. Revenue is recognised as services are performed and at year end a liability is recognised until the service is delivered.

Revenue from a non-reciprocal grant that is not subject to conditions is recognised when the entity obtains control of the funds, economic benefits are probable and the amount can be measured reliably. Where a grant may be required to be repaid if certain conditions are not satisfied, a liability is recognised at year end to the extent that conditions remain unsatisfied.

## Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office. In these circumstances, the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the balance sheet are shown inclusive of GST.

Cash flows are presented in the statement of cash flows on a gross basis, except for the GST components of investing and financing activities, which are disclosed as operating cash flows.

## j) Goods held for distribution

Donated goods and goods purchased for nominal consideration held for distribution are initially recognised at their current replacement cost at date of acquisition. Inventories of goods purchased and held for distribution are initially recognised at cost. The cost of bringing each product to its present location and condition is determined on a first-in, first out basis.

### k) Economic dependence

The entity is dependent upon the ongoing receipt of Government grants and community fundraising to ensure the ongoing continuance of its programs. At the date of this report, management has no reason to believe that this financial support will not continue in the short term.
